

# RESOLUTION No. 382

Adopted by The Sacramento City Council on date of

August 6, 1936

WHEREAS, there has been of late considerable discussion relative to conditions at the Crocker Art Gallery in the matter of safety of the collection of art treasures from the fire hazard standpoint; and

WHEREAS, suggestions have come from various sources concerning the desirability of re-locating the art collection at the Crocker Art Gallery in a fireproof building to be located at some central point on property already owned by the city; and


WHEREAS, the administration of the Crocker Art Gallery, under the terms of the bequest of this art gallery to the City of Sacramento, is vested jointly in the City and the California Museum Association; and

WHEREAS, the City of Sacramento will need the advice and cooperation of the able group of citizens constituting the board of directors of the California Museum Association in the consideration of any plan looking to the suggested relocation of the Crocker Art Gallery; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Sacramento that a request is hereby made to the board of directors of the California Museum Association that this Council be furnished with their advice and recommendations concerning the desirability or necessity of such suggested plan or plans, from the viewpoints of legality, feasibility, necessity and timeliness, and that said board of directors of the California Museum Association be invited to freely express their views to the Council on this important subject.
