RE: 1981 Taxicab Rate Increase

Dear Mr. Crist:

This is an supplement to my letter of March 30, 1981 in which I called to your attention the fact that the taxi industry is suffering badly from the increase cost of doing business due to gasoline increases. I also enclose a copy of a letter from Neal Love indicating the method by which he computed the percentage of increase in the Consumer Price Index. I also enclose herewith a copy of a letter from Mr. Love indicating that to convert the increase to which the taxi industry is entitled by reason of the increase in Consumer Price Index, there would have to be a forty cent increase per trip.

We are, therefore, requesting, on behalf of the taxi industry, an increase in the taxi rates, converting said rates as follows:

First 1/6 mile \$1.60

Each additional 1/6 mile 20 cents

This is an adjustment equal to the percentage change in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index.

Such an adjustment would be in the interest of the public welfare and safety, and although it would probably be insufficient to allow a reasonable rate of return on investment, it is all that is allowed by the present form of ordinance and the industry desires to go forward to at least accomplish an increase of this amount.

In accordance with Section 42.55-1 of the City Code, we request that you schedule a public hearing on the matter and that you send notices ten days in advance to all taxicab



owners in the city and publish the same at least five days in advance.

It is not contemplated that the 40¢ per trip increase in rates will be adequate to cover the steep rise in the cost of gasoline; but I am not bringing up that subject in this application, because there is no enabling City Ordinance to cover that particular problem. This request is based strictly upon the present Ordinance which allows a rate increase based exclusively upon the increase in the Consumer Price Index. We would, therefore, anticipate that because this application is made strictly in accordance with the terms of the Ordinance, that there should be no problems encountered in going straight to the matter in obtaining the increase indicated.

Re: Taxi Rate Increase

Dear Mr. Lobner:

In my letter to you on March 30, 1981, I pointed out that the consumer price index has increased 6.98% from the date of the last taxi rate increase (April 1980). (I am attaching a copy of that letter).

An average trip in 1980 was approximately four (4) miles. Based on this, an increase of 41 cents is warranted. Due to meter adjustment problems, 40 cents should be used. The calculation of average trips and the 41 cents is as follows:

A. 1980 tax revenue	\$2,038,299
B. 1980 tax trips	358,868
C. (A ÷ B) average trip	\$5.68
D. Average trip 5.80 X 6.98 = 41 cents

RE: Taxi Cab Rate Increase

Dear Mr. Crist:

As we have previously advised, because of the increase in the cost of doing business, the taxi industry is in dire need of a rate increase. The provisions of the Sacramento City Ordinance provide for a rate increase when the Consumer Price Index has increased in a certain fashion.

The industry owners are most anxious to accomplish this increase as quickly as possible so as not to suffer grave losses. It will, therefore, be appreciated if, in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance, an adjustment in the taxi rates can be provided. We enclose herewith a copy of a letter from Mr. Neil Love, CPA, indicating the adjustment in the rates which should be made in order to accommodate for the increase in the Consumer Price Index.

We trust that the information contained in Mr. Love's letter will be sufficient in order to allow the increase. If you feel that a hearing on this subject is required, we request an immediate hearing before you for this purpose.


