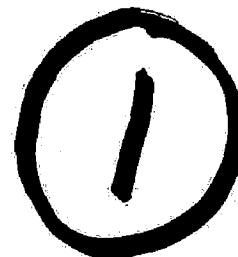
Council took positions on 56 bills; supported 22 and opposed 13. Bills of immediate and exclusive concern to the City of Sacramento were: SB 229 (Boatwright) relating to water meters; AB 748 (Isenberg) creating a guaranteed seat on LAFCO for the City; SB 631 (Johnston) creating a seat for West Sacramento on the Sacramento-Yolo Port Commission; and AB 322 (Areias) authorizing the conversion of a state office building lease to a lease purchase contract. Re: Review of Outstanding and Pending Legislation for the
September 19 Committee Meeting

By the time Committee members read this memorandum, it is likely that the 1991 Session of the California Legislature will have adjourned its regular session sometime during the weekend of September 14 or 15. However, it is quite possible that the Legislature will continue its work in Special Session in order to prepare reapportionment maps, which meet the approval both of the Governor and the courts with respect to Hispanic representation. In the meantime, the following is a summary of key legislation of special interest to Sacramento which is likely to be approved by the Legislature and be sent to the Governor, who has until October 13 in most cases to sign or veto this legislation.

AB 85 (Katz)

This measure would appropriate \$600,000 to the City of Sacramento from the Petroleum Violation Escrow account for energy conservation by means of synchronization of traffic signals. It is likely, however, that the appropriation will be deleted in the wake of joint Assembly-Senate negotiations.

AB 322 (Arelas)

This measure would provide explicit authority to the Department of General Services to convert an existing lease of a state office building into a lease-purchase agreement. The office building is located within the City of Sacramento and is believed to be the Duke building on R Street. The Administration has indicated that it will approve the bill.

AB 748 (Isenberg)

This measure, already on the Governor's desk, would guarantee that the City of Sacramento will have a seat on the Sacramento County Local Agency Formation Commission. The Sacramento seat would be nominated by the Mayor and approved by the City Council. The measure must be approved or vetoed by the Governor by September 16. It was approved by the Legislature unanimously.

AB 1337 (Isenberg)

This is a technical measure sponsored by the Sacramento Area Flood Control District which permits the district to levy assessments and issue revenue bonds with greater facility. It is expected to be approved by the Administration.

AB 2142 (Frazee)

This measure will revise the fine and forfeiture shift from cities to the state government which was approved in conjunction with the state budget in July. More importantly, it will clarify that a \$2 surcharge on local city parking fines will be based upon convictions rather than citations. The difference will mean a general fund savings for the City of Sacramento. Administration has indicated its support.

SB 229 (Boatwright)

This measure would require the installation of water meters on all newly-installed residential connections throughout the state. The Governor has indicated his support.

SB 376 (Calderon)

This measure, originally sponsored by the Tobacco Institute would have preempted all local city and county anti-smoking ordinances. It has been drastically amended to drop the preemption language and has been put over for hearing in January 1992.

SB 631 (Johnston)

This measure adds two additional commissioners to the Sacramento-Yolo Port Commission. One additional commissioner will be appointed by the City of West Sacramento and the second new commissioner will be appointed jointly by the City and County of Sacramento. The City of Sacramento has dropped its opposition and it is expected that the Governor will approve the measure.

SB 828 (Deddeh)

Sponsored by the League of California Cities, SB 828 has been moved to a joint Senate-Assembly conference committee, where the repeal of booking fees and the elimination of the property tax administration surcharge will be discussed. SB 828, at this point, simply indicates that it is the Legislature's intention to reconsider the imposition of booking fees and property tax administration surcharges. The outlook for success in the repeal of these fees is problematical.

SB 1100 (Bergeson)

This measure is sponsored by a variety of health advocacy organizations and the California Medical Association and generally prohibits the distribution of tobacco products to minors. While it encountered significant opposition earlier in the session, it is expected to sail through to the Governor. I am not aware of whether the Administration has taken a position on this bill.
