SUBJECT: FY2005/06 PROPOSED BUDGET - CODE ENFORCEMENT

SUMMARY: This report provides information on the FY2005/06 proposed budget for the Code Enforcement Department. It includes a department description, budget summary and organizational assessment projects to create efficiencies and improvements within the Department.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

- Department description -- Code Enforcement is responsible for enforcing City codes to keep neighborhoods safe and healthy by reducing blight and nuisances. Enforcement activities currently within Code Enforcement include: junk and debris, vehicles, illegal dumping, zoning, graffiti, dangerous and substandard structures, emergency response, vectors, environmental health, tobacco retailers, and entertainment permits.
- Accomplishments In the past year, the department trained and reclassified all Assistant Code Enforcement Officers to Code Enforcement Officers which

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improved efficiency and flexibility in distribution of workload and resulted in the ability to resolve cases faster. We also improved call intake customer service by creating a centralized clerical unit, cross-training employees, and implementing a call center system. The new tobacco retailers licensing program was implemented and approximately 425 licenses were issued to tobacco retailers throughout the city.

Organizational Change & New Department - Code Enforcement is currently a
divisional function within the Neighborhood Services Department. It is proposed
that a new Code Enforcement Department be formed, separating from
Neighborhood Services. A separate department will allow for more focus on the
improvement of existing code enforcement functions, developing a business
compliance and enforcement section, dealing with issues critical to the City
Council, and addressing the future needs of the City's customers.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS: The FY2005/06 proposed budget for the Code Enforcement Department includes 65.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions. The total budget is \$6,314,121, of which \$5,674,204 is General Fund supported.

Recommended Augmentations – The proposed augmentations include new positions for enhanced levels of code enforcement, housing and dangerous buildings inspections, zoning compliance and the formation of a Code Enforcement Department. Staffing additions include 4 code enforcement officers, 4 building inspectors, 1 zoning investigator, 1 department director, 2 administrative staff, 1 technology supervisor, and 1 resource coordinator. The total cost of the augmentations is \$1,355,740 (14.0 FTE) and will be fully offset by revenue generated by the Code Enforcement Department.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS: This report concerns administrative activities that will not have any significant effect on the environment, and that do not constitute a "project" as defined by the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) [CEQA Guidelines Sections 15061(b)(3); 15378(b)(2)].

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS: Code Enforcement will continue to work toward meeting the needs of a growing city. The proposed department and resources will help focus our efforts and create a more effective organization to deal with the changing population.
