SENATE BILL

No. 788

Introduced by Senator Alarcon

February 23, 2001

An act to add Chapter 1.52 (commencing with Section 5094.70) to Division 5 of the Public Resources Code, relating to river parkways, and making an appropriation therefor.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 788, as amended, Alarcon. Parks and Recreation: grants: urban river park projects.

Existing law authorizes the expenditure of state funds for local assistance grants to cities, counties, and districts for the acquisition and development of various park and recreational areas and facilities.

This bill would enact the California River Parkways Act of 2001 for the purpose of directly improving the quality of life in California by providing recreational, open space, wildlife, educational, flood control, and water quality benefits to communities in the state. The bill would authorize the Secretary of the Resources Agency to award grants to state and local agencies and nonprofit organizations on a competitive basis for feasible river parkway projects. The bill would require the secretary, in awarding those grants, to give priority to projects that accomplish specified objectives, including to help improve blighted urban communities adjacent to urban rivers and streams.

The bill would appropriate \$5,750,000 from the River Protection Subaccount of the Watershed Protection Account of the Safe Drinking Water, Clean Water, Watershed Protection, and Flood Prevention Bond Fund to the Secretary of the Resources Agency for capital outlay and

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local assistance projects that are consistent with the bill and the River Protection Program funded by the River Protection Subaccount.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: yes. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 1.52 (commencing with Section 2 5094.70) is added to Division 5 of the Public Resources Code, to 3 read:

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Chapter 1.52. California River Parkways Act Of 2001

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5094.70. This chapter shall be known, and may be cited, as the California River Parkways Act of 2001.

9 5094.71. The Legislature finds and declares all of the 10 following:

- (a) River parkways directly improve the quality of life in California by providing important recreational, open-space, wildlife, educational, flood control, and water quality benefits to communities in the state.
- (b) River parkways can provide communities with safe places for children to play; locations for family picnics; bike and pedestrian trails; areas for water sports including swimming, boating, and fishing, and many other activities.
- (c) River parkways can also help improve blighted urban river areas that were formerly thriving natural resource preserves by providing important recreational and scenic amenities. By improving these areas, we can help decrease urban problems, including crime, pollution, nuisance activity, and other problems.
- (d) River parkways can provide accessible open space that can help remedy the severe shortage in park and open-space areas that plague many urban and suburban communities and small towns.
- (e) River parkways can provide flood protection benefits for our communities by protecting wider corridors along our waterways that help store, and provide safe corridors for, the passage of storm waters.
- 31 (f) River parkways can also protect and restore wildlife and fish 32 habitat.

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(g) California can improve the quality of life in this state by assisting local communities, nonprofit organizations, state agencies, and other agencies in establishing river parkways.

5094.72. For purposes of this chapter, the following terms have the following meanings:

- (a) "Parkways Program" means the California River Parkways Program established pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 5094.73.
- (b) "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Resources Agency. 5094.73. (a) The California River Parkways Program is hereby established in the office of the Secretary of the Resources Agency, to be administered by the secretary.
- (b) The secretary may make grants available to state and local agencies and nonprofit organizations on a competitive basis for feasible river parkway projects from moneys appropriated to the secretary, and from other funds that become available to the secretary for these purposes. Those funds may also be used for administrative costs directly related to the administration of the parkways program.
- (c) Eligible projects may include, but are not necessarily limited to, all of the following:
- (1) The acquisition of real property. Prior to expending grant funds for the acquisition of real property, the grantee shall provide notice to any landowner who owns land immediately adjacent to the real property proposed to be acquired.
- (2) Site improvement projects, including the provision of compatible improvements that enhance the safety of parkway visitors and neighboring communities.
 - (3) Projects to restore and enhance riparian and other habitat.
 - (4) Projects to provide public access to a stream or river.
- (5) Projects to develop visitor services, and recreational and interpretive facilities.
 - (6) Trail projects.

- (d) In awarding grants to state and local agencies and nonprofit organizations under this chapter, the secretary shall give priority to river parkway projects that accomplish one or more of the following objectives:
- 38 (1) Help improve blighted urban communities adjacent to 39 urban rivers and streams.

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- (2) Provide parks and recreational facilities for underserved communities, in urban and suburban communities, and in small towns.
- (3) Protect or restore fish and wildlife habitat in a manner that benefits threatened or endangered species.
- (4) Provide flood control benefits by maintaining or restoring the open-space character of lands along rivers and streams that are subject to periodic flooding.
- (e) When implementing this chapter, the secretary shall give consideration to providing an equitable regional distribution of funding over the lifetime of the program.
- (f) Prior to the release of any funds awarded pursuant to this chapter, the secretary shall develop grant application criteria governing the allocation of these funds consistent with the requirements of this chapter. The secretary shall disburse these funds at least twice a year after announcing and accepting grant applications from applicable state, local, and nonprofit organizations.
- 5094.74. A state or local agency or nonprofit organization that receives a grant awarded pursuant to this chapter shall, to the extent feasible, utilize the services of the California Conservation Corps and local conservation corps in those efforts.

5094.76. Any state agency, local agency, or nonprofit organization that expends grant funds pursuant to this chapter shall file with the secretary an annual progress report on the implementation of the river parkway project that has been funded by the grant.

5094.77. It is the intent of the Legislature that this chapter shall supplement, and not replace or duplicate, existing river parkway efforts undertaken by state and local agencies and nonprofit organizations. In implementing this chapter, the secretary may make grants to entities for the purposes of better utilizing existing river parkway programs, to the extent feasible, to achieve the objectives of this chapter, including, but not necessarily limited to, the implementation and administration of river parkway programs undertaken pursuant to Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 1300) and Chapter 4.1 (commencing with Section 1385) of Division 2 of the Fish and Game Code, Title 7.42 (commencing with Section 66905) of the Government Code, Division 21 (commencing with Section 31000), Division 22.5

(commencing with Section 32500), and Division 23 (commencing with Section 33000) of this code, and Section 7048 of the Water Code, and other river parkway efforts undertaken by local agencies and nonprofit organizations.

SEC. 2. The sum of five million seven hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$5,750,000) is hereby appropriated from the River Protection Subaccount of the Watershed Protection Account of the Safe Drinking Water, Clean Water, Watershed Protection, and Flood Prevention Bond Fund, established by Section 79019 of the Water Code, to the Secretary of the Resources Agency for capital outlay and local assistance projects that are consistent with Chapter 1.52 (commencing with Section 5094.70) of Division 5 of the Public Resources Code and Article 4 (commencing with Section 79100) of Chapter 6 of Division 26 of the Water Code.

BILL SUMMARY:

SB 788 establishes a river parkway projects program, to be administered by the Secretary of the Resources Agency, and appropriates \$5.75 million in Safe Drinking Water, Clean Water, Watershed Protection, and Flood Prevention Bond Act (Prop. 13) funds to the Secretary of the Resources Agency for capital outlay and local assistance projects for river parkway projects, as specified.

STAFF COMMENTS: This bill meets the criteria for referral to the Suspense File.

The bill (1) authorizes the Secretary to award grants to state, local, and nonprofit organizations, on a competitive basis, as specified. STAFF NOTES that there is no match requirement, and (2) provides that moneys in the fund may be used for administrative costs.

STAFF RECOMMENDS that the bill be amended to cap the Secretary's administrative costs at 5% of the amount appropriated.

The Governor's Budget includes \$70 million (General Fund), and \$7.65 million (Prop. 13 funds) for local assistance for river parkway projects. This bill transfers \$5.75 million of the \$7.65 million to this program. Senate Subcommittee
