This report recommends that City Council adopt the attached resolution authorizing a FY 97/98 expenditure in an amount totaling \$200,000 for disposal of City waste at Yolo County Landfill.

Authorization for Disposal of City Waste at the Yolo County Landfill

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The "Combined Service Area" in downtown and midtown can only be serviced between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. This area's parking restrictions were devised to facilitate improvements in the quality of services related to solid waste collection, recycling and street sweeping in a neighborhood where parked cars pose a significant impact on the quality of our service. Due to the limitations related to time and distance traveled, it is not possible for the City's Solid Waste Division to dispose of the waste collected from the downtown combined service area at the Kiefer Blvd. Landfill. Time and distance traveled from downtown to the Kiefer Blvd. Landfill makes it impossible for the two downtown routes effected to complete their collection areas within the required four hour window.

The Yolo County Landfill is much closer to downtown Sacramento than the Kiefer Blvd. Landfill. Due to time and distance, it is possible for our two downtown routes in the combined service area to travel to Yolo County Landfill and to complete their routes within the four hour window required. Yolo County Landfill is the only alternative landfill within the region that we are capable of hauling to that is permitted to accept municipal solid waste.

A pilot program to dispose of waste collected by the two downtown residential routes was implemented. Based on the successful operation of the pilot program, continuation of the program is warranted.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

Tipping fees at the Kiefer Blvd. Landfill are \$28.05 per ton. Tipping fees at Yolo County Landfill are \$36 per ton. The closer distance to Yolo County Landfill offsets a portion of the higher tipping fee by lowering our fleet charges.

However, in order to stay within the timeframe required for collection of the downtown combined service area, the Solid Waste Division would be required to assign up to two extra trucks to service the same collection area with tipping at Kiefer Blvd. Landfill. The assignment of two additional routes to service the same area would be much more expensive. Therefore, due to considerations related to time and distance and the timeframe for collection within the combined service area, tipping at the Yolo County Landfill by the City's two downtown residential routes represents the lowest net cost to the City. Sufficient monies exist in the Solid Waste Division's operating budget.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The City completed an environmental impact report (EIR) related to the direct haul of solid waste by City crews to both the Kiefer Blvd. Landfill and the Yolo County Landfill in 1990. City Council Resolution No. 91-380 certified that EIR and adopted appropriate

CEQA findings. The 1990 EIR studied a number of alternatives. Among them was "alternative 11", called "Division of Waste Stream Between the Kiefer Boulevard, Yolo County, and City Landfills, with Shredding or Balefill at the City Landfill." This alternative, which was not selected as the project to be implemented at that time, was determined to be the "environmentally superior alternative". [DEIR, p. 2-17 and p. 5-38]. Alternative 11 studied the potential environmental effects of hauling a portion of the city's waste stream to the Yolo County Landfill in combination with other measures. It was determined that those effects were significantly less than the "Direct Haul to Kiefer Blvd. Landfill" alternative, which was ultimately selected as the project. The current proposed project would implement, on a very small scale, the element of alternative 11, which provided for hauling of a portion of the city's waste stream to Yolo County Landfill. Because this proposal would have far fewer environmental impacts than the adopted project, and because there has been no significant change in the conditions which existed in 1991, no further environmental review is required at this time.


POLICY CONSIDERATIONS:

The City established a "combined service area" in order to improve service in the downtown and midtown areas. These are restricted parking areas allowing for the provision of all collection services on the same side of the street within a four hour window. In the absence of such parking restrictions, it was difficult for solid waste crews to provide excellent service related to garden refuse, solid waste and recycling collection due to the obstruction of parked vehicles. Providing cost effective service within the four hour window required by the "combined service area" is consistent with City Council's priority related to neighborhood revitalization and enhancement.


There are no M/WBE landfills within the region that are permitted to accept municipal solid waste.

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AN EXPENDITURE
IN AN AMOUNT TOTALING \$200,000 IN FY 97/98
FOR DISPOSAL OF CITY WASTE
AT THE YOLO COUNTY LANDFILL**

WHEREAS, hauling waste from the City's two downtown residential routes in the "combined service area" to the Kiefer Blvd. Landfill within the four hour window dictated by parking restriction is not possible with only two trucks; and,

WHEREAS, hauling waste from the two downtown residential routes in the "combined service area" to the Yolo County Landfill within a four hour window is possible due reduced travel time and distance; and,

WHEREAS, the net cost of hauling waste from the two downtown residential routes is less at Yolo County Landfill compared to Kiefer Blvd. Landfill because only two trucks are required to this task within a four hour window;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SACRAMENTO THAT:

The Solid Waste Division is authorized to expend an amount totaling \$200,000 in Fiscal Year 1997/1998 for the disposal of City collected waste at the Yolo County Landfill.


